ARKANSAS

In 2022, more than **48 million** domestic and international travelers visited Arkansas, spending **\$9.2 billion**, which supported **70,000** jobs and generated **\$752 million** in state and local tax revenues, according to research commissioned by the Arkansas Department of Parks, Heritage, and Tourism. These numbers are substantial, but they don't tell the whole story. Communities across Arkansas are promoting their cultural, natural, and historic assets to tell their stories, deliver remarkable travel experiences, and drive economic vitality.

The key segments that make tourism an engine of growth for Arkansas, include:

National Park Service: There are 9 national parks and in Arkansas:

ARKANSAS

In 2022, **4.3 million** park visitors spent an estimated **\$278 million** in Arkansas' gateway communities supporting a total of **3,900** jobs with a payroll of **\$107 million**, according to the *National Park Service Visitor Spending Effects Report*.

U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) Recreation: USACE is one of the nation's leading providers of outdoor recreation. In Alabama, it manages **19** lakes and rivers:



ARKANSAS

In 2022, these natural and recreation sites attracted **15.7 million** visitors, who spent **\$875.7 million** in Arkansas' gateway communities, supporting a total of **4,999** jobs with a payroll of **\$176.2 million**.

U.S. Forest Service: There are 2 national forests in Arkansas:

- Ozark
- St. Francis

These forests provide clean air and water, preserve cultural resources and conserve lands for the enjoyment of present and future generations, and support the economies of gateway communities through recreation, timber, energy, and minerals. According to U.S. Forest Service research, these forests annually contribute **\$144.9 million** to Alabama's GDP and support **2,090 jobs** with a payroll of **\$91.4 million**.
